Why the World Needs the Truth of God's Word

Only 5 percent of the over two million pastors in the world are trained for pastoral ministry. In today's post-Christian culture, poorly equipped pastors, teachers, and ministry leaders have not been able to teach biblical truth accurately in the face of mounting cultural pressures. Sexual immorality, the sanctity of life, the definition of marriage, and other cultural pressures have resulted in "theological erosion" within the church. Our culture attempts to undermine the authority of Scripture, and our world displays the results of this erosion.

- Rigorous, biblical education—the Seminary experience is foundationally a spiritual transformation process for each student. At the center of our students' journey through DTS is the study of and appreciation for our triune God and His Word.

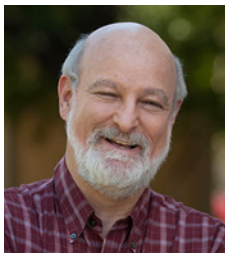

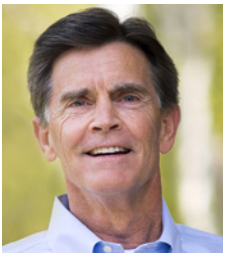

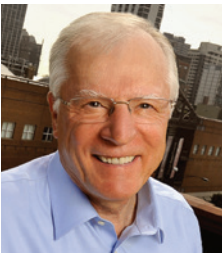

Free Theological Training

Dr. Yarbrough tells his students when they complete their first class at the Seminary that they now have more training than 95 percent of the pastors in the world.

While our purview has always been global, we are compelled to do even more. DTS is committed to address the global theological famine in the church, which is the need for competent and qualified church leaders who are grounded in God's Word.

During the past six years, DTS has developed 21 free online courses for believers who want to study biblical or theological topics. **Astoundingly, 400,000 people from around the world have registered for these courses!** These learners come from all over the world: every part of the United States; various parts of Africa, especially sub-Saharan Africa; Latin America; and Southeast Asia.

A surprising number of these online students are pastors who have no access to biblical training. These courses are the only biblical training these pastors have ever received.

Our commitment is to provide pastors who have an extreme need for theological education and little hope of attending formal Seminary programs with the high-caliber training DTS offers. As a result of this campaign, **we will add 15 free online courses and translate all 36 free courses into Mandarin and Spanish.** By increasing the number of courses and offering them in three languages, we anticipate **reaching more than 2 million believers worldwide** over the next three-to-five years.

We are not waiting for students to come to us. We are ready to reach out to them.

Training Pastors Worldwide

We recognize that many pastors and ministry leaders around the world will not only want to take a few Seminary courses, but they will want to **complete an online certificate program of biblical and theological topics**. We want to offer a **free certificate curriculum of select courses in English, Mandarin, and Spanish**.

To implement this program, we recognize the need to partner with a network of international schools, many led by DTS graduates. Our goal is to use campaign funding to pilot a series of select biblical and theological courses by **developing a prototype certificate program**. We will work in partnership with key schools in Asia, Africa, and Central and Latin America, making this a major opportunity for pastors and ministry leaders globally.

Formal Degree Programs

We recognize that some pastors and ministry leaders need a **formal DTS degree program**—and the full biblical and theological education that it provides—for their level of leadership. With Internet access, we can offer DTS master's-level degree programs anywhere in the world, allowing students to study in their home countries as much as possible and providing funding for in-person training when required. Campaign funding will be used for financial aid and expanded course offerings in Spanish and Mandarin. Starting with a master's degree in Biblical and Theological Studies, **DTS will also launch classes throughout the Middle East in Arabic**.

Faculty and Student Recruitment

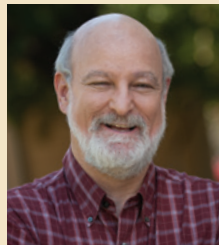
A primary reason students choose DTS is our world-renowned faculty. Our faculty exemplify servant-leadership in education. As our faculty members reach retirement age, we must recruit new faculty members who will carry on our tradition of teaching truth and loving well.

DTS is also committed to recruiting students who are leaders on a national and international level. Extensive marketing, social media, and website design plans are in place to attract men and women for ministry training.

Student Discipleship and Mentoring

Dallas Theological Seminary wants to be intentional in equipping the next generation of servant-leaders. We are partnering students with leaders in business, ministry, and education for two semesters. A group of approximately one hundred students will be discipled each year for four years.

Our trained leaders will use one of two discipleship curriculums with each student. The student can then use these curricula to disciple others. DTS will also host an annual discipleship summit for students, alumni, and churches.



Darrell Bock (ThM, Dallas Theological Seminary; PhD, University of Aberdeen) is executive director of Cultural Engagement and senior research professor of New Testament Studies. He has authored over thirty books. He serves as host of the Seminary's *The Table* podcast, is a consulting editor for *Christianity Today*, and serves on the boards of Wheaton College and Chosen People Ministries. He has also been a *New York Times* best-selling author in nonfiction.



Dorian Coover-Cox (ThM, PhD, Dallas Theological Seminary) serves as professor of Old Testament Studies; associate editor for *Bibliotheca Sacra*, the Seminary's academic journal and editor of the Journal of the Evangelical Theological Society (JETS). She has served on the editorial and translation committees for various Bible translations, including the NET Bible, Christian Standard Bible, Holman Christian Standard Bible, and The Lexham English Bible. Her niche for Hebrew flourishes in the classroom as she encourages students as they learn.



John Hannah (ThD, Dallas Theological Seminary; PhD, University of Texas at Dallas) serves as a distinguished professor of Historical Theology and research professor of Theological Studies. He ministers nationally and abroad as a teacher, preacher, and conference leader. He has authored a number of books, including *Intimacy with God* and *The Kregel Pictorial Guide to Church History* (volumes 1–6).



Michael Ortiz (ThM, Dallas Theological Seminary; PhD, Seminario Teológico Centroamericano) currently serves as chair for the Department of Missiology and Intercultural Ministries at DTS. Most of his ministry prior to DTS involved theological education leadership and teaching in Spanish-speaking countries, especially Cuba. While at DTS, Michael has served as the initial director of DTS *en Español*, a department developed to offer master's degree programs to the Spanish speaking world. He also currently serves as International Director for the International Council for Evangelical Theological Education and Interim Vice President for the South Central Region of the Evangelical Missiological Society.



Passion City Church in Atlanta, Georgia, created Passion Global Institute, inviting DTS faculty to equip their staff and membership in theology, Scripture, and ministry. The goal is more biblically trained leaders for church, parachurch, missions, and marketplace contexts. The program currently has 150 students.

Strategic Church Partnerships

DTS remains committed to train leaders for the local church. Doors are opening to partner with large, influential churches to train their staff while they minister full-time. Instead of the church sending one or two staff members to study at DTS, we are going to the church and training their entire team of 50 to 100 people. For example, in Atlanta, we are working with North Point Church, where 150 staff members are completing a DTS degree program. This church will have 150 theologically trained ministry leaders working throughout its network of thousands. Moreover, other church members and individuals in the Atlanta community are attending the classes being held at North Point.

In addition to North Point and Passion City Church in Atlanta, the Seminary has forged partnerships with large churches in Fort Worth, Austin, San Antonio, Indianapolis, College Station, Nashville, and Phoenix. Campaign funding will be used to engage six more churches across America in the next three years. Imagine the depth of scriptural teaching and discipleship that will pour out through these churches into their cities.

Strategic Cultural Connections

Right in the middle of our culture's current chaos, strategic opportunities lie before us. The Seminary's **Hendricks Center for Christian Leadership and Cultural Engagement** offers programs that focus on God and cultural issues. **Over 644,000 individuals and ministry leaders have turned to DTS to learn how to biblically navigate topics like LGBTQ+ issues, world religions, apologetics, mental health, and diversity issues.**

The Hendricks Center also hosts conferences to help believers address current issues in ministry, faith, and work. Campaign funding will extend the Hendricks Center's influence among DTS students, alumni, churches, and communities nationwide.

Strategic Campus Connections

Each one of the DTS campuses target the unique population and culture of their local communities. Houston is the most ethnically diverse city in America, and the DTS-Houston student body reflects that diversity. The students studying at our Washington, DC, campus reflect the powerful concentrations of leadership in the area, such as public policymakers, corporate and military leaders, and Christian ministry visionaries. In fact, leaders throughout the East Coast travel to study in this DTS hub. **Imagine the impact of biblically trained leaders in our nation's capital and throughout the northeastern U.S.**

Campaign funding will be used to expand our Washington, DC, facilities to accommodate rapid growth. We are partnering with a local church that will allow us to utilize their classrooms for DTS courses and provide us with the opportunity to build staff offices and a theological library.

The greater Washington, DC, area has nine million diverse residents from around the world. Political leaders, government workers, military, and contractors are all potential workers in the harvest. We're here to build a movement of training Christlike servant-leaders for God's global harvest. He is still drawing people to His harvest.

When I was growing up in Romania, the Communist regime was not allowing pastors to be trained for ministry. After thirty years of freedom, though more resources are available, the vast majority of pastors in our country still do not have seminary training. In my opinion, the greatest need they have is to learn how to accurately study and practically teach and apply the Word of God. Without the proper training, so many of them misinterpret the Bible and use it as a pretext to support their own opinions. Often times, the Word is preached in a legalistic and manipulative way. As a result, many believers live joyless, performance-based Christian lives, driven by guilt and fear. Oh, how they need to be taught the liberating truths of God's Word and to discover His marvelous grace! That is what I experienced at DTS, and it forever changed my life and ministry.

DTS Heritage Center

Plans are underway to develop a Heritage Center on the Dallas campus to ensure prospective and current students understand the Seminary's deep commitment to biblical truth and ministry impact worldwide. This unique presentation will commemorate DTS's legacy by featuring stories and special collections showing God's faithfulness. The center will encourage alumni and campus visitors as they learn about DTS's 100-year commitment to teach truth and love well.

Turpin Library Renovation

The Turpin Library on the Dallas campus serves students in all of our locations and degree programs. Since opening in 1984, it has played a vital role in the academic preparation and training of DTS students, faculty, staff, and alumni. God has used the library's resources to assist evangelical authors, pastors, and leaders from around the world.

There are about 313,000 books and resource items housed in the library. Various theological books in the collection are out of print and do not exist in digital format. The Seminary's archives and all of the Seminary's Special Collections, including rare Bibles and a Hebrew Torah, are displayed in the library.

The library now requires renovations to maintain its usefulness. The original air-conditioning and boiler system are in great need of replacement to ensure a safe and efficient learning environment. Upgraded noise containment, furnishings, and a new circulation desk are also needed to restore the building to a standard of excellence.

Central Plant/Deferred Maintenance

The new Central Plant will replace the air-conditioning systems for four Dallas campus administrative buildings (Stearns Hall, Davidson Hall, Horner Administration Building, and Hendricks Center for Christian Leadership). At DTS, most of our HVAC systems are twenty years old. The new Central Plant will provide higher efficiency and reduce the complexity of maintaining multiple systems for different buildings.

Todd Academic Building

The Todd Academic Building, a central classroom facility, needs renovations to provide wheelchair accessibility to the bathrooms and elevators. The building's exterior also requires waterproofing to extend its usefulness for many more decades.

Current Scholarship Programs

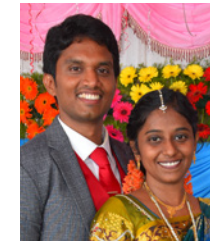
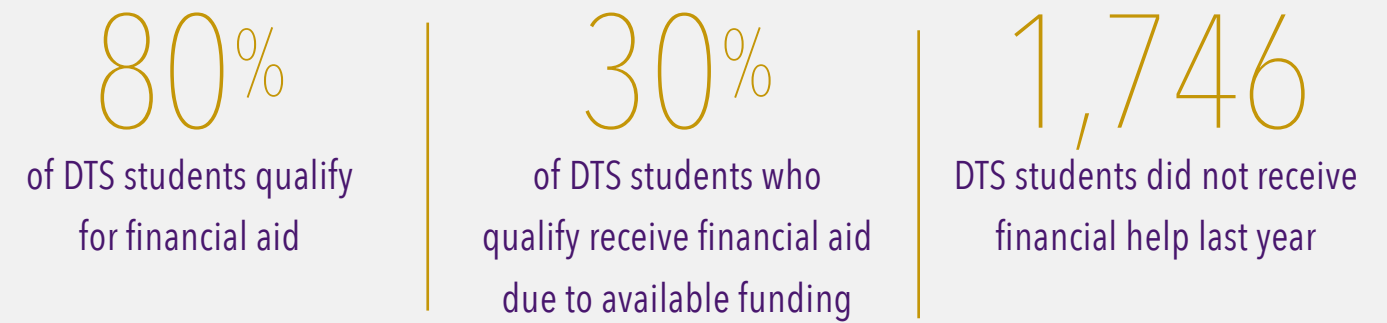
Statistics show that financial barriers are the number one reason students do not attend DTS, drop out of DTS, or fail to enter full-time ministry upon graduation. While DTS strives to maintain low tuition rates, graduate-level education is costly. Most DTS students work part-time while balancing study, family life, and ministry commitments. Moreover, one in four international students who apply to DTS are accepted, and 98 percent of them require scholarship funding for tuition and living expenses.

At this time, 80 percent of our students qualify for financial aid, but current funding only allows 30 percent of our students to receive aid. Less than 10 percent of students utilize loans each year. Graduating with little or no debt is vitally important to those entering ministry positions.

Each year DTS students are awarded over \$5 million in scholarships and aid to reduce their financial burdens. Scholarships provide students with support and encouragement both to start and finish their DTS degree and pursue the ministry to which God has called them.

So many remarkable men and women are called and led by God to attend the Seminary. The number one reason students can't come or can't continue is a lack of funding. Therefore our goal and prayer is to remove those financial barriers for these gifted leaders so they can receive the biblical, theological, and ministry preparation they need for long-term, life-changing ministries.

New Endowed Scholarships

Many donors choose to give scholarship support to students by creating an endowed scholarship.

Establishing an endowed scholarship

- distributes an annual award at a rate that is designed to preserve the scholarship;
- allows the fund to be named in memory or in honor of a family or individual; and
- invests the principal, and a portion of the investment value is distributed annually (currently 5 percent).

Endowed scholarship funds allow DTS to build a financial aid plan that will attract future leaders in strategic ministries worldwide. The current scholarship endowment totals \$52 million.

Annual Operational Support (Five Years)

\$50 million

The DTS Board of Trustees oversees the Seminary's finances. We are grateful to the Lord that our annual operational funding has been achieved for the past twenty years. The Seminary maintains no debt other than student housing (income-producing properties).

Because DTS receives no denominational or governmental support, our operational budget is derived from two primary sources: tuition and gifts. Unrestricted gift income comprises approximately 40 percent of the Seminary's total annual operating income. All gifts to the annual operational fund will count toward the campaign goal and significantly help train the next generation of graduates committed to communicating God's Word.

Building a Legacy—New Planned Gifts

Gifts In Your Will

Naming your charities in your will is a wonderful way to support Dallas Theological Seminary.

The Foundation offers complimentary Estate Design Services. They will evaluate your goals and prepare a memorandum highlighting options for accomplishing your goals efficiently and in a God-honoring way.

Appreciated Assets

Certain assets can trigger a capital gains tax when they are sold. These include stocks, bonds, and mutual funds; real estate; mineral rights; and even privately-held businesses. The capital gains tax can range from 15% to 23.8%, plus state tax. You can manage this tax by making outright gifts to DTS, making partial gifts, or using a specially-designed trust, which can pay you or your loved ones income for life.

Gifts That Pay Income

Income gifts accomplish two objectives with the same resources—they create income, and they support the ministry of DTS. Such gifts provide a cost-effective way to accomplish multiple goals while realizing valuable tax benefits. These benefits include a tax deduction, and capital gains taxes avoidance.
