



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

Mark L. Bailey

Dr. Mark L. Bailey came to Dallas Theological Seminary in 1985 as a professor in the Bible Exposition department. In March 2001, Dr. Bailey was named as the Seminary's fifth president in its 95-year history. In June 2020, Dr. Bailey will transition from his role as President to Chancellor.

For over 40 years, his career passions have been theological education and pastoral ministry. He has also led numerous tours to Israel and the Middle East, and has authored such texts as To Follow Him: The Seven Marks of a Disciple and Nelson's New Testament Survey. His board service includes Insight for Living, Bible Study Fellowship, and Walk Thru the Bible Ministries.

Dr. Bailey and his wife, Barby, have been married 47 years. They have two sons and six grandchildren. Through all, his vision for family and faith is clear: "to lead people to a love for God through the study of His Word. This guides my life, family, involvement at church, and ministry to DTS."

Barby is the wife of Dallas Theological Seminary President, Dr. Mark Bailey. For over 35 years, she has ministered to women through leading Bible studies and speaking at women's retreats. In her current role of President's wife, she travels extensively with her husband and heads up the faculty wives' functions, hosts

the Board Wives' gatherings, and mentors some student wives through DTS's Student Wives in Ministry program. Barby has authored two books entitled *Meeting Girls Like Us* designed to connect women today with their ancient sisters in Scripture. She is currently finishing Book 3 in this series.

John Hannah

Dr. John Hannah has served at Dallas Theological Seminary for more than 48 years and currently serves as Distinguished Professor of Historical Theology and Research Professor of Theological Studies. He is a graduate of Philadelphia College of Bible (now Cairns University (BS), Dallas Theological Seminary (ThM, ThD), Southern Methodist

University (MA), the University of Texas at Dallas (PhD), and had a postdoctoral fellowship at Yale University. He also received an honorary doctorate (DD) from Carver College, Atlanta, GA. He ministers nationally and abroad as a teacher, preacher, and conference leader. He has authored a number of books, including *The Pictorial Guide to Church History* (six volumes, 2000-2009); *Our Legacy: A History of Christian Doctrine* (2003); *How Do We Glorify God?* (2008); *An Uncommon Union: Dallas Theological Seminary and American Evangelicalism* (2009), 1, 2, 3 John: Redemption's Certainty (2017), a commentary on the Apostle John's letters, *Invitation to Church History, World* (2018) and *Invitation to Church History, American* (2019). John and his wife, Carolyn, have two married daughters, Rebecca, who is married to Craig (a DTS grad), and Nancy, who is married to Scott. They have six grandchildren, which include a set of triplets!

Carolyn Hannah also serves on staff at DTS as the advisor to Seminary Wives in Ministry (SWIM). She was instrumental in creating the program and has led the effort for 20 years. 
